


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OUR VALUES

ABOUT US

Windana Support Centre is funded by the Department of Justice and Attorney-General under the Supported Assistance and Accommodation Program (SAAP). This program aims to provide short term accommodation and support to women (any age) and children (up to the age of 18) who are escaping domestic and family violence. Since 2001 we have had five self contained two bedroom units to accommodate women and children in our refuge and four ancillary houses to offer further accommodation should our women and children require it. In 2020, we were successful in applying for two headlease properties to accommodate clients waiting on immigration outcomes. An extra unit is reserved for office space and we can accommodate an average of 11 women and up to 25 children at any one time.

OUR HISTORY

Windana has had a long and proud history as one of the first women's refuges in Queensland. The service began around 1977 and was originally sponsored by the Sunnybank Family Support Centre, and then the East Brisbane Community Centre for many years. Windana commenced in a very dilapidated Main Roads demolition stock house in East Brisbane and then moved to a slightly better rental property in the same area. Due to a major security breach, Windana then moved to a CAP property in Windsor and remained there until the property was destroyed by a Molotov cocktail in the late 1990s. In 2001, we moved to our current premises.

Since our inception, Windana has been involved in a wide range of activities apart from service delivery. Windana workers and other interested parties lodged a submission to establish the Chisholm shelter in the early 1980s. Both Windana and Chisholm were instrumental in establishing the Migrant Women's Emergency Support Service (MWSS) in the 1980s. Staff from both refuges recognised the barriers and disadvantages faced by immigrant and refugee women and their children and took action to address that gap in service delivery. The Migrant Women's Emergency Support Service later became the Immigrant Women's Support Service (IWSS).

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

SERVICE REPORT

Another year has passed and Windana entered into its 46th year of operation. It has been an interesting twelve months for women as they cannot plan for the but the biggest issue affecting the refuge sector is the absolute lack of affordable housing options for women and children trying to leave shelter. Since the pandemic, interstate and overseas migration as well consecutive interest rate hikes has resulted in a shortage of available rental properties and rents have shot up accordingly. Whereas once we could encourage women to look for more affordable private rentals on the outskirts of Brisbane, properties in these areas have risten to over \$600 or \$700 per week. We have had meetings with Department of Housing representatives, but they say they have been slammed by the sheer number of people living in tents and in hotels. Earlier this year the Premier stated that every Queenslander on the cusp of homelessness will be found crisis accommodation, including hotels. Hotels across south east Queensland are at their limit and QCOSS states that there are 45,473 people on the social housing waitlist in Queensland. Housing representatives have said that there is little movement in their current stock. Windana's statistics for the 2023/2024 our clients have been with us for 6 to 12 months even though we are funded to provide only 13 weeks of accommodation. Extended periods of time in refuge is not always a healthy option for clients as it can lead to an overdependence on refuge

staff for emotional and practical support and decision making. It is disempowering next stage of their life. It also creates barriers for children with schooling and social networks.

On a more positive note however, Windana received a 20% increase in our funding which was the result of an iniative of the state government to appropriately fund responses to domestic and family violence and to improve women's safety in Queensland. We plan to increase our mobile support program to provide outreach to women and children in the community.

Service delivery

In our temporary supported accommodation program (refuge), Windana has accommodated and supported 31 women and 43 children during the 2023/2024 financial year. We have had an occupancy rate of 92% in our 11 units of accommodation which includes: 5 refuge units; 4 ancillary houses and 2 headlease units.

Staffing

I would like to thank my colleagues, Liz, Rhondda, Angela W, Traci, Debb, Christie, Leonie, Yana, Minnu, Emily, Angela C and financial year suggest that nearly 50% of Sue for all they have done this year. The work we do can often be challenging and the vicarious trauma can tax emotional well being. We are a close knit team and their support, humour and commitment to the organisation makes Windana a great place to work.

SERVICE REPORT

Family Support

Angela W, Traci, Debb, Christie, Yana, Minnu, Leonie, Emily, Sue and Angela C provided a range of case management support to our clients over the past 12 months including emotional support, court support, transport to and from appointments, referrals to legal and health services, therapeutic support, emergency relief, domestic violence education and parenting support.

Early Intervention Worker

Angela W, our early intervention worker, frustrating telecommunication provided therapeutic support and protective behaviours to 17 of our children in the 2023/2024 period. Angela took a leave of absence from Windana in July this year as she was offered a role within the education system. Angela has a unique skill set with her children's therapeutic support abilities and her counselling skills and she will be an asset in her new role. She has been difficult to replace at Windana and the clients and staff miss her enormously but we wish her every happiness in her new position.

Finance

Liz is the best financial brain in the refuge sector and we are lucky to have her. She has, once again, done an excellent job of maintaining our very tight budget. It is her considerable skills that enable us year after year to achieve the best possible outcomes in service delivery. We are able to financially support so many of our most

vulnerable clients who rely on so very little income to live because of Liz's clever accounting skills.

Administration

We reluctantly said farewell to Rhondda in January this year as she had finally decided that hours of sitting in traffic each day travelling to work was too much. Rhondda was a quiet achiever who completely overhauled our administrative systems. She coped admirably with our varying levels of IT competence, companies, SHIP reports, maintenance issues, registers and a myriad of other responsibilities with efficiency and a great sense of humour. We thank Rhondda for all that she did for our service and wish her the very best in her current role.

Management Committee

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our dedicated management committee. Jenny T, Jenny W, Tim, Jodana, Michelle and Loren. They volunteer their time willingly and never complain when we ask them to review policies, attend meetings, answer emails, approve payments or any of the many tasks we request of them. Without our Committee, Windana wouldn't be the wonderful organisation it is today. I would particularly like to thank Jenny Thor for stepping up once again to be our Chairperson, Jenny W for being our Treasurer and Tim for taking on the Secretary role.

SERVICE REPORT

Students

Students have always played an important part of our service. Windana recognises that students are integral to the future of this industry and we place great importance in providing quality supervision and education to these women who will be the next generation of workers. We have been fortunate in the students, Yana and Julia who have been placed with us this year. We say thank you to them.

It is with pleasure that I present the Windana Support Centre Inc. Treasurer's report for the financial year ending 30th environment is fraught with challenges June 2024. The accounts audited by Haywards Chartered Accountants are included with the Annual Report. I would limited affordable housing options, acts like to express my appreciation to Haywards and, to Brad Harbourne for his expert advice in auditing our accounts once again.

I report that, through excellent financial management and control of costs, we have again ended the year with just a small loss on paper after depreciation costs. As always, we are grateful for the level of support from businesses, organisations and individuals in the community which enables us through their generosity, to offer additional services to meet the needs of clients who are increasingly diverse and those who have more complex issues. The impact of the housing crisis continues to reverberate around our communities, leaving QLD and Brisbane particularly in a dire situation. A report compiled by UNSW Sydney for Queensland Council of Social Services (QCOSS), shows that unmet need for social housing in Queensland now exceeds 100,000 households - FIVE TIMES the official waiting list number.

Since the pandemic began, house rents have surged by 23% nationally, but by a punishing (for tenants) 34% in Brisbane. The impact on such a severe general shortage of housing, is that women and children fleeing domestic and family violence, are often left with nowhere safe to go. "For many women victims of DFV, the decision to leave an abusive beyond the immediate threat of violence. The housing crisis, characterised by as a significant barrier."



Increased funding:

From the 1st January we saw the first "uplift" to the State Enhancement funding that services had been receiving since COVID to help meet just a fraction of the drastically increased demand for services in the community. This provided for increased mobile support services to provide assistance to women and children in the wider community who were experiencing domestic and family violence and was gratefully received. On the 29th April we were further thrilled to see announcements of a substantial funding increase of 20% for frontline

domestic, family and sexual violence services in Old. From the 1st of July 2024, our core program funding, as well as the uplifted State enhancement funding have all been rolled up into new recurrent contracts, incorporating a further 20% funding boost as well. This unprecedented and greatly welcomed move has given services much greater certainty around funding to allow for sustainable planning and recruitment. It will also streamline our reporting going forward, reducing our dependence on multiple, time-limited enhancement funding contracts. All of this allows us to increased service delivery costs and redirect more of our focus to where it is most needed - delivering services and support to women and children escaping their work had for too long been domestic and family violence.

unions and the broader sector, to ensure that the supplementary Federal homelessness funding contributed to meet the Equal Remuneration Order (ERO) won in 2012, would no longer be negotiated separately to the National Housing and Homelessness Agreement (NHHA), but would be wrapped into the base amount and would now be part of the ordinary funding in the NHHA and will therefore continue in each five-year funding cycle. This has been an ongoing fight since 2012 to ensure that adequate funding would be provided to meet continue to uphold the recognition won by Community Services workers that undervalued and underpaid.

In March 2024, there was another key win for the sector. We heard the very good news that the Federal Government had given the guarantee sought by

They have generously donated funds this year towards supporting training and education needs for women and children to the continued existence of our escaping domestic violence. 



MOBILE SUPPORT REPORT

One of the things I love most about my job at Windana, is that every day is different! Some days are spent supporting a client during court proceedings, making and attending appointments for psychological support and immigration advice, or liaising with police or hospital staff. Some days are spent applying for financial assistance, picking up food hampers, advocating for fee reductions or sourcing a fridge for a client when hers breaks. Many days are spent sitting with a client, listening and providing emotional support while she speaks about the devastating stories of her past, her fears about having to start over, or her concerns for her children's safety and future.

Regardless, it is always rewarding work, and I love it.

The women in our Outreach Service are generally moving out of crisis, and into the rebuilding phase of their lives. This can be such a challenge for our clients, who have often been socially isolated and financially controlled for many years. This is especially true for the culturally diverse women for whom English is a second language. Simple life skills such as making appointments and accessing services, engaging with school environments, finding employment, maintaining a tenancy, and budgeting and paying bills are skills our clients have often not utilized in a long time, if they have been living with a controlling and abusive partner. I enjoy supporting our Outreach clients in this process and seeing them begin to take back control of their own lives.



Moving forward into 2025, we are excited to be expanding our Mobile Support program through additional funding. We have begun collaborating with DV Connect, in the hopes of being able to partner with them to support some of the many women waiting in motels for a refuge space. This is an exciting opportunity to broaden our scope and impact, and I'm excited to see how our Outreach Service will grow in 2025.

Christmas in July



REFERRAL TO SERVICES THAT OFFER SOCIAL INCLUSION PROGRAMS



Nexus Care in Everton Park provides an excellent service to many of our clients, they run English classes for those women who are not eligible to access the Adult Migrant English program through TAFE, provide a food and emergencyfinancial relief programand offer career advice and employment assistance. Nexus has helped many of our women to write up their resumes and some of our women have obtained jobs through them. Nexus also holds playgroups which some of our women attend regularly.



COMMUNITY NETWORKS

The Combined Women's Refuge Group (SEQ) is a peak body that represents the interests of the women's refuge sector in south east Queensland. Windana has been heavily involved in this group since its inception in 1978 and this year has been no different.

On the 8th December 2023, the State government held a Not Now Not Ever breakfast to celebrate the actions that the Queensland Government has continued to take to deliver support services for victim survivors of domestic and family violence in Queensland and to hold people who use violence and abuse

to account. This breakfast raised a total of \$27,250.47 for the CWRG of south East Queensland. This is the biggest donation that the CWRG has ever received and we will use it to forward the interest of the women's shelter sector in Queensland. After much discussion, the CWRG began regular meetings for support workers earlier in the year. This is an opportunity for all support workers to get together, to learn from each other and to obtain peer support.

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COMMUNITY EDUCATION

In line with our current strategic plan, Windana has tried to take every opportunity this year to educate the community about the impacts of domestic and family violence on women and children. Bernadette and Angela have spoken at Rotary meetings and the QUT School of Social Work about the dynamics of domestic violence, its impact on victim/survivors and the role of women's refuges.

DV education is essential in reducing the stigma surrounding domestic violence in many communities and in also informing women and children from culturally and linguistically diverse cultures that there are support services and legal services that can assist



COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Zephyr

Zephyr has been providing school supplies including uniforms, books, laptops, pencils and shoes to children in refuge for many years now. Isabella, Carmel and their team of volunteers ensure that no child in the refuge sector commences a new school without all the items they need. They deliver the items almost on the same day that we call them and they never refuse a request.

The Rotary Club of Toowong

Carolyn and her team at the Rotary Club of Toowong have worked tirelessly this year to raise funding for the women and children of Windana. They raised thousands of dollars for new appliances for our women including: microwaves, ovens, vacuum cleaners, toasters and kettles. Rotary also gives our women and children gifts and hampers for Christmas and Mother's Day.





COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

OZ HARVEST

This is an organization that collects excess food from supporting businesses and delivers it to people and charities within the community. Ozharvest has been delivering fresh food to Windana every week for years now and these deliveries really assist our women, particularly those who are on very limited income.

Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity is a grassroots organization that has a vision of a world where everyone has a safe place to live. This organization has been a lifesaver for Windana over the past few years especially after we flooded in 2022. Habitat for Humanity uses corporate volunteers for their labour and they have painted, weeded, sanded and cleaned our units and the backyard of our shelter. Under the leadership of Helena Bundock, the Habitat for Humanity team cleaned, sanded and painted one of our units of accommodation in February this year. The units have a high tenant turnover and are not painted by the Department of assist people in need. In 2022, Thread Housing all that regularly. Friends with Dignity

Friends with Dignity have once again shown their generosity and support to the women and children of our service. When women come into refuge, they often have to leave furniture and

household possessions behind and afterwards, may find it difficult to retrieve furniture as their partners change the locks to the property and force women to have to resort to property settlement to get any items returned to them. When a client obtains an exit property, Manuala and her team of volunteers from Friends with Dignity spring into action and fill the house with lots of lovely furniture, knick knacks, linen, kitchen utensils and toys for the children. It gives women and children a great start for the next stage of our journey.



Thread Together

Thread Together is an organisation that was established in 2012 to source unsold new clothing from fashion retailers to Together contacted the CWRG as they wanted to partner with women's refuges to expand the network of charities that they support and Windana came on board. We have ordered clothing for our clients, including children on several occasions and the clothes are of a very high standard. The ordering process is very simple and is similar to ordering through an online clothing site. This is infinitely better than keeping second hand clothes onsite which never seem to be the size or gender required.
